IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS

EDUCATION IMPACT

- **1,554** children entered kindergarten prepared to learn
- **13,697** school age children received before and after school support and enrichment
- **253** school leaders received training to address impacts of student chronic absenteeism
- **23,885** students received pandemic-related learning loss support
- **18,924** students received resources they needed to stay and thrive in school
- **344** young children received brand new books in English and Spanish



HEALTH IMPACT

- **27,574** individuals received preventative medical and dental care
- **13,543** adults received mental and behavioral health services
- **1,238** children received counseling and mental health care
- **7,119** people received reduced price prescriptions resulting in savings of \$692,403



FINANCIAL STABILITY IMPACT

- **712** adults received job training leading to livable wage jobs
- **2,668** people (families with children) received emergency shelter, eviction avoidance support, and affordable housing support
- **118** people received free tax filing support
- **518** teens and young adults received career readiness training and support



BASIC NEEDS IMPACT

- **3,500** homeless students received holiday care packages filled with essentials to help them get through winter break
- **3,600** children and teens from 60 schools received food, clothing, school supplies, and hygiene items
- **21,250** meals were provided and served to 1,450 children at 20+ sites
